

AT AGE 50, THE APA HAS LOST ITS WAY. IN 2022, CAN APA FIND A PATH BACK TO ITS MISSION?

Former APA Member Chad Dawson and Adirondack Wild propose this way forward in 2022:

- Leadership APA is leaderless and a rubber stamp for applicants. A reinvigorated, dynamic and independent leadership for both the APA board and staff is immediately required.
- Membership APA was given an environmental mission in 1971. APA's Board needs members with backgrounds in science, public lands, resource stewardship, environmental policy and law.
- Staffing APA staff must represent the best in conservation science, stewardship, policy and law and be properly trained, motivated and led.
- Strategic Planning During climate change, APA is needed to measure, track and monitor environmental and community trends and changes within the Park's public and private lands.
- Water The Park's precious lakes, ponds and waterways quality, carrying capacity, wildness require APA's immediate strategic planning attention.
- The Legislature The Park is a statewide, not local treasure. The state legislature must reengage with Governor Hochul and stakeholders, to assess, strengthen and fund the mission and performance of the APA. Conservation design legislation is a starting point.
